Reflection: Vincentians' Most Difficult Task

Literature dating from the earliest days of the Society reflects that alleviating Neighbour's material needs is often easier than meeting their need for encouragement, sympathy and friendship. As was written nearly two hundred years ago:

"Love and peace are two blessings which we endeavour to preserve amidst us; and, if we enjoy them ourselves, should we not attempt to diffuse them, especially among the poor, whose... miseries we try to alleviate? Who, in fact, is not aware that physical want is often the least of their misfortunes? The old man alone in the world, the orphan child, may no doubt suffer from cold and hunger; and yet, of possible evils, these may possibly be the least dreaded; for public commiseration may readily come to their assistance. But that which afflicts them is, that no friendly hand ever presses theirs, [and] no kind heart shares the burden of their sorrows..."

"Here the Society of St. Vincent de Paul endeavours to fill up the chasm. Its members go forth among the poor, not simply to dispense material help but, with the tender heart from which, through the grace of Christ, flow words of consolation, which are truly gifts of the best kind, they bring home to the poor man the conviction that he is not only assisted, but beloved. It is the part of the Vincentian Brother to pay not merely a flying visit to the abode of the indigent, but to enter leisurely; to seat himself on, perhaps, the only chair the room contains, to listen to his tale of misfortune; to encourage the disclosure of some soul-oppressing secret; to mingle tears with tears; and thus, by gentle patience and kind demeanour, to implant gradually in that withered heart feelings of gratitude for the friendship shown him."
