From the Chair:

The other day, as the sunshine struggled to make its way through the winter grime on my windows, I found myself thinking about spring cleaning and wondering if that's still a thing. When I was a boy, my mother would muster all hands for a week of thorough house cleaning. Each of my siblings and I had assignments as befitted our age. We couldn't understand the need as, to us, there was nothing wrong with the house the way it was. Nevertheless, the heavy scents of Javex and Pine Sol filled the air; our hands were red and our knees in agony. No battlefield general could have planned a more spirited attack on the accumulation of dust and grit, and none would have been more pleased with their results. Those memories are, I think, the reason we dream of having a clean house; but who dreams of actually doing the cleaning?

I wonder if the idea of spring cleaning might be a good way to think about how our Conferences and Councils are operating after the long winter of the Pandemic. Circumstances beyond our control forced us to find new ways to serve our Neighbours in Need. Is that what you signed up for or do you see your mission as something more?

Like water, it's human nature to take the path of least resistance. It's easier to let someone else take leadership responsibility; it's easier to hand out other people's money than ask hard questions or have difficult conversations; it's usually easier to do it yourself than make the effort to help a new Conference member learn the job; it's easier to pretend that a fixed time between vouchers is the same thing as equity of service. All these seemingly small deviations become like the accumulated grime of winter on and in your house. All could probably benefit from a spring cleaning. Think of it as chance to hit the reset button on our Vincentian vocation.

On a cheerier note, summer will soon be upon us. Our Camp registrations are going well, and we look forward to entertaining a lot of young boys and girls at Marygrove Camp and Camp Ozanam. June is frequently election time for Conferences. I thank all the retiring Presidents for their service and wish all the new Presidents the best of luck; never hesitate to reach out if you should feel the need for assistance. Most of our Conferences will enjoy a bit of a

break from the regular meetings as will the Board. Of course, the important work never takes a break and I thank each of you for your continued efforts during the summer, and a special thanks to committee members and the Board who keep at it throughout the year. I hope that you will all have some down time to recharge and enjoy family and friends and that you will return rested and eager to go in September.

A reminder that all Vincentians must be screened. In the rare occasion that persons volunteer for only one activity such as Bundle Ups, or annual packing of Christmas hampers, screening may not be required, however, anyone who has any contact with neighbours or their financial or personal information or is regularly involved with the Conference must be registered as a member through screening, otherwise they are not covered by our insurance. No one should be participating in Conference meetings or financial activities, unless they are in the process of joining the Society or are fully screened members.

We have a clear duty to protect the persons we serve, consequently discussions about service to Neighbours in Need at Conference meetings should be considered private and should be undertaken with as much sensitivity as possible. Your Special Works – Life Long Housing – St. Francis Residence

Another valuable program operated by GTCC, making a significant difference in the lives of vulnerable adults. Operating, since 1984, and offering 24 persons who live with mental health a safe and welcoming environment, get to know our St. Francis Residence, Bathurst and Dundas Streets, Toronto.

Our history:

In the 1980's the Ontario Government made a policy decision to cut back on their in-patient beds at the psychiatric institutions. Subsequently, many patients who were discharged into the community were unable to adequately advocate for themselves and lived in sub-standard housing or they became dependent on the emergency shelter system for survival. As this situation became increasingly unacceptable, the government of Ontario created a program that would provide housing for people who had experienced psychiatric illnesses, working with Not for Profits. Through this funding stream, the Society of Saint Vincent de Paul opened St. Francis Residence in 1988 providing safe and secure housing to 24 men and women. Available funding does not cover all costs of this worthwhile service. The Society of St. Vincent de Paul funds a significant portion of the program at St. Francis Residence each year.

Our program:

St. Francis Residence offers permanent supportive housing in a community-based setting for 24 men and women who have a history of mental health problems and:

- are stabilized and capable of living in a community-like setting;
- are independent enough to participate in basic daily living activities; and
- who freely choose to live in our home.

St. Francis Residence is classified as a Personal Care Boarding Home, and is operated as such under the terms of the Tenant Protection Act, by the Society of Saint Vincent de Paul, Greater Toronto Central Council. We offer private and semi-private bedrooms, shared washrooms and bathing facilities, lounge areas, an outdoor patio and spacious garden, and three meals and snacks a day.

Supervision

Trained Staff provide 24 hours of supportive supervision in a life-giving, homelike environment. Staff encourage independence, socializing in the community, and development of life skills. When needed, staff will assist and give direction with laundry & housekeeping chores.

Applications, Screening & Support Services

The Ministry of Health provides programmes through Habitat Services, including initial screening of referrals for suitability, ongoing residential activities and staff education through C.O.T.A. (Comprehensive Rehabilitation and Mental Health Services), and quarterly standards of care inspections. All applicants to St. Francis Residence are referred to Habitat Services for the admission process, contact us if you require further information on admissions.
