Reward Through Rejection

"If you choose, you can make me clean..." "I do choose. Be made clean (Mark 1.40)

Father Matthew McCarthy of the Archdiocese of Toronto in his January 11, 2024 Daily TV Mass homily placed the Gospel story within the following thought-provoking framework:

But what if Jesus didn't choose? So this leper leaves room for Jesus to refuse to give him what he asks for. What might be the reason Jesus chooses not to heal or give us what we asked for? One reason is that Jesus takes our Salvation and Salvation of others around so seriously that sometimes He might be willing to refrain from giving us what we ask for if what we asked for is in the end going to be an obstacle to attaining Eternal Salvation. Sometimes a good thing might not be so good in the end.

God in fact is very generous with us when it comes to advancing our way to Eternal Life and those of the people around us. He is willing to lavish upon us.

The invitation for us, therefore, is to take the attitude of the leper who said, "Lord, if you choose, you can make me clean". Let's' be bold in asking God for whatever it is that's on our heart. We can be sure that if it furthers our way and the way of others to our Eternal Reward, we will receive those gifts, as Jesus says in "good measure and overflowing".
